As an accomplished tapestry artist working in the Aubusson tradition, Ruth Jones has shown her work extensively throughout Canada, the United States and internationally. Her tapestries are owned by IBM Corporate Headquarters, New York; Museum of

During the month of October, the guild is responsible for providing a display in the museum case at the entrance to the Bellingham Public Library. This is a great opportunity to let others in the community know about our guild and provide a little extra publicity for Fibers and Beyond.

The United Nations has declared 2009 to be the International Year of Natural Fibres. In keeping with that, we plan to show natural fibers and things made from them in the library's display case.

ANWG NEWS

This year the ANWG Board will award 5-10 grants of \$200 - \$400 each. Though every effort will be made to make the grants in allotments of \$400, the final number and dollar amounts will be based on the final budget. Preference will be given to guilds who have not received a grant in the past five years.

The purpose of ANWG guild grants is to promote weaving education within the ANWG region by assisting guilds to hold weaving workshops. The instructor must not be a member of the applying guild. **Applications for a guild grant will be accepted until November 1st, 2009.**

For those guilds that are awarded a grant, half of the grant amount will be sent to guilds in January of 2010. The balance of the grant will be sent to guilds upon receiving guild workshop reports and receipts for workshop expenses. (If sending half of the money after the workshop report and receipts have been received places a financial hardship on the applying guild please contact the ANWG Education Chair to discuss an alternate distribution of funds.) The workshop must occur within the year 2010. If *any* part of this application presents an undue problem for your guild, please email us so that we can discuss your problem.

Upon holding the workshop, guilds receiving an Education Grant must send a report, along with workshop receipts, to the ANWG Education Chair. The report should give a description of the workshop and number of participants. Photos are encouraged. This report is due within two months of the date on which the workshop is held.

Workshops Update

THE FAB FOUR workshop with Robyn Spady is filling nicely but we still have a few more spaces. Note this workshop is on a weekend so if you are working, here is your chance for a workshop.

The Fab Four is an exploration of uncommon four-shaft weaves such as double-faced overshot, double-faced twill, swivel (petit-point effect on fabric), bead leno, corduroy (both single and double), honeycomb, myggtjäll (mock leno), Bedford cord, etc. This is a round robin workshop with 12 different weave structures included.

Warps – students provide their own warps. All the yarns requested are cotton, mostly 5/2 although one of the samples requires 20/2 and one 10/2. These yarns are easy and cheap to buy if you don't already have them in your stash.

Venue – The Marina Cost – approx \$80 with 12 people, about \$100 with 10 people

TAPESTRY WEAVING – I am getting closer to finding a tapestry instructor, so all interested people, hang onto that thought.

THE LEARNING CURVE

Calling all potential Learning Curve leaders – would those folks who are considering offering sessions on rigid heddle, basketry, beading, bookmaking, dyeing, [or anything else] please let me know we can start looking at some dates.

The Learning Curve is a process through which guild members share their skills with others. This sharing usually takes the form of a mini-workshop of a few hours or a day. Although many of our instructors are very knowledgeable about what they are teaching, you don't have to be an expert.

For example, one area of interest in the Guild is in card/tablet weaving. This is a very ancient and basic form of weaving. I can't believe that nobody in this Guild can card weave. All we need is someone who can give us a day-long starter session to get us going. Then if we want a more advanced workshop, we can get the Guild's workshop coordinator to find an expert. Now don't go saying well gee I don't know and dig your toe in the sand. Your Guild needs you. You will get all the help you need in organizing it and thinking it through. Giving a Learning Curve session will give you a great sense of confidence, you will have the satisfaction of knowing that you have contributed to your Guild, you will meet some wonderful people, and you'll get RICH (well, maybe not rich, but you will be paid.).

Bonnie's Easy Ikat needs you on Nov 5th

If you are thinking of taking this workshop, you need to let me know immediately. If we don't have at least ten people signed up by Oct 5th, we will have to cancel the workshop, as Bonnie requires a month's notice of cancellation.

This is just a one-day workshop. Bonnie is very concerned with design and colour, as well as the ikat process. Usually ikat is a very time consuming and finicky process that requires many wrappings and unwrappings of fine threads. It seems that Bonnie has developed a way of preparing ikat that makes it more accessible to the average weaver. She brings the materials with her. It is 3/2 cotton which is a good size, easy to handle. In this class we will learn the principles of ikat and then we can adapt them to any yarn we like.

No dyeing will be done in the class. We will be preparing the warps in the class and the dyeing can be done at home. This makes Bonnie's a very affordable workshop. If you have never done any dyeing, don't worry, I am hoping to have a Learning Curve workshop on dyeing this year.
