LINDA REES RETURNS TO BELLINGHAM TO TALK TAPESTRY

On March 10, 2010, the Whatcom Weavers Guild welcomes Linda Rees back to Bellingham as she visits her "home" guild to share her tapestries and stories. Rees spent most of the 1980s in Bellingham as a working fiber artist and proponent of the local art scene.

By working in the medium of tapestry for over 40 years, Rees has developed her own unique style. By focusing on nonobjective themes while exploring color and form or by creating pictorial pieces where she tells a story with her imagery, Linda Rees expressively works with color and fiber to create remarkable tapestries.

Her visit to the region next month is a reconnaissance trip to check out a future venue for a two-person exhibit she is participating in at the La Conner Quilt & Textile Museum (Sept. 29 - Dec. 31, 2010). Fortunately, she has time

Roeder Home Docents meeting

As you probably know, Dayweavers are now meeting at the Roeder Home on the first Thursday of each month. One of the county's requirements to hold our meetings there is that there be at least one "person in charge" during the meeting. It could be more than one person during a given meeting, perhaps one to be there at the start of the meeting, and another who would stay till the end. In order to serve as a "person in charge," you need to go through the county's orientation session.

There will be an orientation meeting at the Roeder Home on Tuesday, Feb. 23, at 3 p.m. for all those in the guild who would be willing to serve in that capacity. It is expected to be a brief meeting, and will include getting signed up with the Whatcom Volunteer Center and going over docent duties including activity supervision, event reporting, clean-up and open/close procedures. The Whatcom Volunteer Center has offered to be an umbrella organization to provide liability insurance for events at the Roeder Home, so that step is important (but simple). Docent duties will be explained by Rob Bunnett of the County Parks Department.

Roeder Home fibers starts March 24

The Roeder Home Fibers committee will host its first event on Wednesday, March 24, from 1 to 3 p.m. at the Roeder Home. We will have several pre-warped looms and spinning wheels ready to use.

As a way to publicize this, we will have a couple of the Roeder Home spinning wheels available for people to use at the upcoming Spin-In on Saturday, March 13. By the way, the Spin-In itself will be a great place to shop for fiber, meet other spinners, and just generally have a great time messing around with fibers. It will be held at the Fairhaven Middle School Commons area and doors open at 10 a.m.

In addition, we will be inviting people from one or more retirement groups to this first-time Roeder Home event.

We are looking for a few more folks to help with the March 24 event. If you could come help acquaint people with spinning or weaving, please sign up

to help. If you happen to have some yarn or fiber in your stash you would like to donate to the effort, that also would be welcome.

In the near-term, we plan to have walk-in spinning and weaving available on alternate Wednesday afternoons, on the Wednesdays the spinners aren't using the home. As we go along, we may well add some specific project-oriented offerings and some other times to the schedule. We will be looking for volunteer help from guild members to support these events.

In a more long-term vein, the committee has also discussed the possibility of offering a "fiber fair" day at the Roeder Home in early summer. We would like to include a lot of activities oriented toward children as well as adults. Then we could possibly follow this with week-long sessions for children during the summer, maybe 2 to 3 hours each day, in which we would step through a curriculum of dyeing, spinning, felting and weaving. All of this depends, of course, on the availability of the Roeder Home for these activities and on guild volunteer help.

We have also been in touch with a number of elementary school groups, home-schoolers, Girl Scouts and the Boys and Girls Club, and have been met with a lot of enthusiasm. For the school groups, we may be able to coordinate with them for the 2010/11 school year and offer a curriculum that addresses the general topic of "How does cloth come to be?" For home-schoolers, the scouts, and Boys and Girls Club, our involvement may come sooner than that.

In order for all of this to be successful, we are in need of long-term support from the guild, primarily in the form of time from individual guild members to help host the events. Think about how you might like to be involved, even if the March 24 event doesn't work out for you.

Whatcom Art Guild (WAG) is actively pursuing its strategy to provide a cooperative gallery for its members. On March 12th, this will open in the Fairhaven site used for their Holiday Show. Based on feedback from participating WWG and WAG members, some changes are being made to 'gallerify' the space (including a utility area, less booths, improved lighting, a rentable class space). Twelve-foot booths are available for monthly rental of \$20, with a 30-day commitment. All participants must be a member of WAG. This is an opportunity for individuals - WWG will not be organizing participation as it has done in the past.

WAG is also holding its Art by the Lake show on Memorial Day weekend at the Bloedel Center. Our Guild has been invited again as guest artists. FAB FOUR WITH ROBYN SPADY. March 20 & 21 (Sat, Sun)

This is an exploration of uncommon four-shaft weaves such as double-faced overshot, double-faced twill, swivel (petit-point effect on fabric), bead leno, corduroy (both single and double), honeycomb, myggtjäll (mock leno), Bedford cord, etc. This will be a round robin workshop with 12 different weave structures included. There is still room in this workshop. The Fab Four is a good workshop to renew your creative energy. It is also a good way to learn more about weaving whether or not you can see yourself using these structures in specific projects. Taking a workshop is also a good way to meet people in the guild if you feel you are not finding it easy to meet folks in our busy meetings. Note the Fab Four is on a weekend so if you are working, here is your chance for a workshop. And finally, the most important reason to take this workshop is that learning something new helps to ward off Alzheimer's. I didn't make that up. Studies have been done.

Warps - students provide their own fibres. All the yarns requested are cotton, mostly 5/2 although one of the samples requires 20/2 and one 10/2. These yarns are easy and cheap to buy if you don't already have them in your stash. I have the drafts and will send you one when you sign up.
